We will be learning about...

During the next seven weeks, we will be reading JB Priestley's allegory play "An Inspector Calls". We will focus on the Birling family and how they respond to the news brought to them by the Inspector. Furthermore, we will look at how Priestley used particular writer's methods to influence readers. We will also explore the context in which the story was written and how that also influenced Priestley's writing
